

ORDINANCE NO. - 140

- (i) MASTER OF PHILOSOPHY IN CLINICAL PSYCHOLOGY (pg.3 of RCI guidelines)
(ii) MASTER OF PHILOSOPHY IN PSYCHIATRIC SOCIAL WORK.
1. The Degree of Master of Philosophy will be abbreviated as M.Phil.
 2. **ELIGIBILITY** - A student will be allowed to join the M.Phil. Course if he hold a Master's Degree of this University or any other University recognized as equivalent there to with atleast 55 % marks in aggregate or equivalent grade. For SC/ST/OBC minimum of 50% marks in aggregate is essential as per GOI. (Item 4.2 pg. 9 of RCI guidelines)
For - **M.Phil. CLINICAL PSYCHOLOGY - M.A./M.Sc. Psychology**
(With specialization in Clinical Psychology)
For- **M.Phil. Psychiatric Social Work - M.A. Sociology/Social Work**
 3. a) In each of the Post-Graduate teaching Departments, There will be a M.Phil. - Committee comprising such teachers of the department or of an allied department as may be associated with the course/research programmes. An external expert may also be co-opted to this committee at the discretion of the Kulpati. The Head of The Department shall be the chairman of the committee.
b) The M.Phil. Committee will perform the following functions:
 - (i) To draw up the syllabus for the M.Phil. Course for the consideration of the Board of studies. (Joint meetings of the M.Phil. - Committees of the Departments concerned are held for the formulation of inter-disciplinary M.Phil. Courses).
 - (ii) To recommend names of supervisors of M.Phil. Candidates and to assign topics for dissertation.
 - (iii) To plan and organize seminars, group discussions etc. to propose names of internal examiners, evaluation of seminars.
 - (iv) To propose a panel of three examiners for each course/ dissertation for the consideration of the examination Committee.
 - (v) Any other function assigned to it by the Kulpati.
 4. An application for admission to the M.Phil. Course will be made on a prescribed form to Head of the Departments on payment of the prescribed fee, by July 1st, every year.
 5. The durations of the M.Phil. Course will be **two academic years**.
 6. These courses come under self- financing scheme and 30 seats (each M.Phil. course) have been granted by the para-Medical Council Department of Public Health, Family Welfare & Medical Education, Govt. of Chhattisgarh, Raipur.
 7. Admission to these courses will be given through screening i.e. according to merit and interview.
 8. The medium of instruction will be English only.


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9. A students who wants to join either of the M.Phil. Course must provide a photocopy of:-
- (i) **Degree Certificate of, M.A. Psychology/ Sociology/Social Work**
 - (ii) **Marks-sheets of M.A. Previous and final year examinations.**
10. At the time of interview every candidate must produce the original degree certificate of M.A./M.Sc. Psychology / Sociology/ Social Work, mark-sheets of M.A. Previous and Final year examinations. All the original certificate will be returned immediately, after verification.
11. The candidate has to produce a character and conduct certificate from the Principal/ Head of the department of the concerned Degree College.
12. The candidate must submit a migration certificate from the University/Institute From Where He/she has passed his/her last examination, at the time of his/her joining - if he/she has passed from any other University than Hemchand Yadav University, Durg.
13. The candidate has to be a full time Post-Graduate student i the Institute, continuously for two years. Furthermore, the candidates are strictly prohibited from joining any job or undergoing any part-time or correspondence courses by a University or any other agency.
14. The candidate will be working in the psychiatric unit - i.e. - O.P.D., indoor wards, emergency unit and special clinics as well, according to the schedule.

M.Phil. EXAMINATIONS, UNDER THE FACULTY OF SOCIAL SCIENCES

THE SYLLABUS WILL BE DECIDED BY THE CONCERNED BOARD OF STUDIES

Regular Candidate - Means a person who has completed (prosecuted) a regular courses of study in the Institution and seeks admission to an examination of the University as such.

Ex-student - Means a person who has admitted in an examination as a regular candidate and was not declared successful thereafter or was not able to appear in the examination though admission card was properly issued to him/ her by the University and seeks admission again to the said examination.


A Regular Course of Study - Means the Students has attended atleast eighty percent of lectures and ninety percent of practicals and clinicals separately.


N.B. - As mentioned above, lectures shall include tutorials and seminars.

Admission of a Regular Candidate to an Examination of the University:

1. The Regular Candidate will be allowed to appear in the examination of the University only after he/she:
 - (i) Has been enrolled as a M.Phil. Students in accordance with the provision of the Ordinance.


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- (ii) Possesses the minimum Academic qualification for admission to the examination of M.Phil. in CLINICAL PSYCHOLOGY (PG. 3 OF RCI GUIDELINES)/ Psychiatric Social Work, and has pursued a regular course of study for that examination.
 - (iii) Has been enrolled as a student of the University.
2. Candidates will not be permitted to intercept the course of studies. if they do so they will not be eligible to appear in the examination.

M.Phil. EXAMINATION

M.Phil. in **CLINICAL PSYCHOLOGY (pg. 3 of RCI guidelines)**/ Psychiatric Social Work will be conferred after the candidate has undergone the specified training and passed the M.Phil. Part- I and M.Phil. Part II, Successfully, after the commencement of the training course (written, viva, practical and clinical).

Application -

The application for registration should reach to Registrar, Hemchand Yadav University, Durg through the Director, on a prescribed form accompanied by a certificate stating the candidate is eligible for appearing in the M.Phil. Examination.

The examination form shall be submitted within the prescribed date.





Examination (pg. 14 of RCI guidelines)

The examination will be held in two parts (Part- I and Part- II) Part- I is held at the end of first year and Part- II is held at the end of second year A candidate will not be allowed to take the Part - II examination unless he/she has passed the Part - I examination.

A candidate who has not appeared or failed in Part - I of the regular examination may be allowed to continue the course for the II year and be allowed to take the supplementary Part-I examination.

A minimum period of three months additional training shall be necessary before appearing for the examination in case he/she fails to clear part- I and/or Part - II examination.

A candidate has to complete the course successfully within a period of four years from the year of admission to the course.

No candidate shall be permitted to appear either of Part- I or II examination more than three times.

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Appearance for each examination (pg. 18 of RCI guidelines)

A candidate shall appear for all the Groups of Part- I and Part – II examination when appearing for the first time.

A candidate in Part – I and Part – II, failing in any of the " Group-A" subjects (Theory papers) has to appear again in all the "Group- A" subjects.

A candidate in Part- I, failing in "Group-B" has to resubmit five full- length Psychodiagnostic Records/ Case records.

A candidate in Part – II, failing in: Group-B" has to resubmit five fully worked- out psychotherapeutic Records (only applicable to Clinical psychology).

A candidate in Part – II, failing in "Group-C" i.e. dissertation, has to reappear/ resubmit the dissertation as asked for and/or outlined by the examiners.


Marks obtained by the candidate earlier in internal assessment, case reports, case records, therapy reports and dissertation shall be carried over for determining his/her results.

Scheme of examination –

Board of Examination (pg. 17 of RCI guidelines)

1. There will be four examiners, two internals and two externals. The chairman of the board of examiners will be the head of the Department of Clinical Psychology who will also be an internal examiner. Two examiners, one internal & one external, shall evaluate each theory paper and dissertation two examiners, of whom one shall be external, will conduct the practical/clinical and vivo-voce examination. **(Item 4.13 pg. 17 of RCI guidelines)**
2. The examination will consist of written, oral and practical/clinical. The examination of M.Phil. Part I will be held after the candidate has successfully completed the course of 12 months M.Phil. Part I consists of three papers and oral viva.
3. Internal Assessment In each paper 30% marks (in case of clinical psychology) & 20% marks (in case of PSW) will be determined on the basis of written/clinical exams, viva-voce and supervised clinical work. These marks will be added to the marks allocated to the respective subjects in the yearly final examinations. The results of the final examinations will be declared on the basis of the total so obtained. The guidelines for allotting the internal marks may be prepared by the institution concerned. **(pg. 13 of RCI guidelines)**
4. The candidate who has successfully completed the course of another 12 months and who has passed the examination of M.Phil. Part I will be eligible to appear in the examination of M.Phil. Part II.

Minimum for Pass

- To pass the examination the candidate must obtain minimum 50 percent of the maximum marks in each paper. 50 percent of the maximum marks in the practical and Oral tests taken together & the dissertation (in case of Part – II only)
- A candidate who fails to pass or to present himself at the examination may be admitted to one or more subsequent examinations on a fresh application being made after fresh fee being paid.
- Candidates must be enrolled 2 years prior to the examination and be allowed to appear provided they fulfill the requirements for the course.
- A candidate who obtains 75% and above marks in the aggregate of both the parts shall be declared to have passed with distinction. A candidate who secures between 60% and below 75% of marks in the aggregate of both the parts shall be declared to have passed M.Phil. degree in I Class. The other successful candidates as per the clause (a) of the above shall be declared to have passed M.Phil. degree in II Class. If a candidate fails to pursue the course on a continuous basis, or fails or absent himself/herself from appearing in any of the university theory and practical examinations of part – I and II, the class shall not be awarded. The merit class (Distinction/First Class) is awarded to only those candidates who pass both Part – I and II examinations in first attempt **(pg. 17 of RCI guidelines)**

SYLLABUS

M.Phil. (Psychiatric Social Work) Part - I

Paper I: - Psychiatric Social Work

(Total hours in year – 160 hours)

Unit 1. The field of Psychiatric Social Work: Basic concepts and theoretical frame work, historical development, major approaches in psychiatric social work, and value concepts underlying psychiatric social work practice.

Unit 2. Therapeutic Models in Psychiatric Social Work -- various theoretical approaches in individual treatment and processes of individual treatment techniques.

Unit 3. Indian System of treatment - Yoga, Kundalini, Zen Buddhist Therapies, Traditional healing methods, Transcendental Meditation.

Unit 4. Group Treatment – principles and practices. Family Therapy – Historical background, approaches and methods of practice.

Unit 5. Family as a Social Systems – Normal and pathological families, its implications on mental health, Ecology and mental illness.

Unit 6. Practice of psychiatric social work in different organisations such as Industrial Organisations, Child Welfare Agencies, Family Service Charitable organisations, Non- traditional Mental Health Services. Religion and Secular Institutions for the Retarded, School Settings and Correctional Institutions.

Unit 7. Mental Hospital as a Social System – psychosocial aspects of hospitalisation.

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Paper II: - Psycho-Social Perspectives on Mental Health

(Total hours in-year - 160 hours)

- Unit 1.** Behavioural approaches to personality and Psychopathology – personality development in childhood, adolescence and adulthood – An overview. Socialization, genetic influence: Identification and emergence of individuality, organisation and actualisation.
- Unit 2.** Cognition and Cognitive Aspects – cognitive map, concepts of learning and development, learning and memory, instrumental conditioning. Learning: classical theories, and Learning Disabilities.
- Unit 3.** Cognition and Intelligence – Developmental factors. Intelligence: Theories and Intelligence Tests: An overview.
- Unit 4.** Motivation and Emotion – Social context, fulfillment and frustration of motives, incentive theory of motivation – fear as motivation – stress theory and theories of emotion and measurement.
- Unit 5.** Social Psychology – Leadership and attitudes, attitude change, measurement of attitudes.
- Unit 6.** Psychoanalysis and Psychotherapy – Origins of psychoanalysis, pre-Freudian attitude of mental disorders, psychoanalytic approach and scientific methodology, stages of psychosexual development and defense mechanisms. Psychoanalytical basis of psychotherapy, trends in psychoanalysis, psychotherapeutic devices: Catharsis, Suggestion, Persuasion, Hypnosis, Desensitisation and Re-education: special psychotherapies: Non-directive therapy, Play and release therapy (Group Therapy) and conditional therapy and retraining methods.
- Unit 7.** Socio-genesis of mental Disorders – Coping patterns in different cultures. Socialization and mental health, Value conflicts.
- Unit 8.** Psychodiagnosics – Techniques of evaluation, cognitive function and their measurements, tests of intelligence and intellectual impairment, personality tests and tests of achievement and attitude.

Paper III: - Social Work Research

(Total hours in year - 160 hours)

- Unit 1.** Epidemiological Methods – The epidemiological approach, prospective – retrospective methods, source of data, and the use of vital statistics: Measures of mortality and morbidity.
- Unit 2.** Scientific Method in Social Research – Observation, features of scientific method, problem hypothesis and testing hypothesis.
- Unit 3.** Method of Experimental Enquiry – Causal relations, types of causes, general principles in detecting causal relations.
- Unit 4.** Sampling Methods – Complete enumeration, sample survey, preference for sample survey, sampling and non-sampling errors, random sampling methods: simple random sample, systematic random sample, stratified random sample and cluster sample.
- Unit 5.** Descriptive Statistics – Central tendency, dispersion, skewness, kurtosis, regression and correlation.
- Unit 6.** Statistical Inference – Point and interval estimates, test of null hypothesis, parametric and non-parametric tests of statistical hypothesis.
- Unit 7.** Methods of Scale Construction – Selection of items, item analysis and various methods of scale construction. Theory of Measurement – Definition, levels of measurement and approximate statistical technique for each level of measurement.
- Unit 8.** Analysis of Variance and co-variance: one-way and two-way classification, Latin Squares.
- Unit 9.** Experimental Designs – Requirements for a good experiment, the idea of control, method of matching, method of errors control, simple randomised designs.

1. Case Work-up.
 2. Case Presentation.
 3. Seminars
 4. Case conference.

Paper - I: Advanced Psychiatric Social Work

(Total hours in year - 160 hours)

Unit 1. Theoretical Formulation - Social work as a therapeutic profession, practice of social work in mental health. Problem Formulation - Various approaches to social diagnosis.

Unit 2. Social Work with Problem Children - Child guidance movement and the involvement of social workers, social work activities in schools, in institutions like Remand Homes, Certified Schools, Borstal Schools and Correctional Services.

Unit 3. Therapeutic Community - Theoretical formulation: Principles and practices. Mental hospital as a social system. Practice of therapeutic community approach in hospitals, Correctional Institutions etc. and evaluation of therapeutic community approach.

Unit 4. Rehabilitation Programmes - Semi-hospital programmes and the role of psychiatric social worker. Participation of family in rehabilitation of patients, use of private and public facilities in the community, problems in rehabilitation.

Unit 5. Transactional Analysis - Principles, theory and practice.

Unit 6. Teaching Methodology - Teaching for a professional programme.

Unit 7. The Social Work Educator - As a role modeler and enabler.

Unit 8. Field Instruction and Supervision in Psychiatric Social Work.

Unit 9. Evaluation of learning and teaching in a professional context.

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Paper II: - Community Mental Health

(Total hours in year - 160 hours)

Unit 1. Introduction - Purpose and objectives of the course, General philosophy of Community Mental Health as a service delivery: Principles, concepts and components of Community Mental Health. Community Mental Health as an emerging system of Mental Health care in India and brief overview of urban and rural dimensions of Community Mental health in India.

Unit 2. Community Mental Health projects - Clinical skills required for Community Mental Health practices. Non-clinical functions, consultation / prevention. Non-therapeutic group activities, research / evaluation, training administration.

Unit 3. Community Mental Health in relation to the other forms of mental health services including traditional and folk healers, preparation, utilisation and supervision of para-professionals and volunteers in urban Community Mental Health, specialised services in children, youth, aged, retarded delinquents, etc.

Unit 4. Rural and Urban Dimensions of Community Mental Health - Ideal definition of Community Mental Health in Indian context. Reality of Community Mental Health practice in Urban and Rural communities. Meaning of Community in urban context.

Unit 5. Epidemiological research in the field of mental Health, relevance to Community Mental Health.

Unit 6. Existing health and mental health care facilities in urban and rural setting in India. Interface of 'Modern' mental health services and traditional services of folk healers in rural communities. Typical forms of mental illness observed in rural areas. Typical treatment of mentally ill in rural areas without professional intervention with respect to urban and rural services, the roles of allied disciplines in Community Mental Health.

Unit 7. Specialised training courses to professional workers in the field of Mental Health rationale methods and follow-up.

Unit 8. Recent developments and trends in the field community mental health. Assignment of client / patient cases by field instructor based on individualised and progressive student learning needs.

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Paper III: Psychiatry Including Common Neurological Problem

(Total hours in year – 160 hours)

Unit 1. Diagnostic Methods and Classification – Methods of case Study and examination of patients; interview techniques with individuals, families etc.; Classification and Symptomatology – Neuroses, Psychoses, personality disorders, Common Neurological and Neuro-surgical problems, and their management.

Unit 2. General Theoretical Background – Development of psychiatry as a scientific discipline: Classical psychoanalytical and psychological influences; Neo-Freudian and other psycho-social interpretations; Philosophical, Transactional, Existential, Communication, Social System approaches and recent advances in knowledge about causation of mental illness and the treatment and rehabilitation of mental patients.

Unit 3. Common Neurological and Neuro-surgical disorders - Description, aetiology related deficits management (treatment, rehabilitation), special consequences of neurological and neurosurgical disorders, relevance of social intervention.

Unit 4. Community Psychiatry – General principles and practice of community psychiatry, community psychiatry in India, primary, secondary and tertiary prevention and roles and functions of the community psychiatrists.

Unit 5. Child Psychiatry – Theory and practice of child psychiatry: Functional and neuro-disorders in children, causes and incidence of mental retardation, classification and rating techniques, management and rehabilitation.

Unit 6. Psychosomatic Medicine – Development of psychosomatic approach in the mental health: principles and psychosomatic approach; emotional factors involved in physical ailments and methods of treatment.

Unit 7. Forensic issue in mental Health – Legislation in India, U.S.A. and U.K.; legal aspects of commitment of institutional treatment procedures of handling medico legal problems of patients; methods of discharge of committed patients; law and social responsibility / safe-guards for mental patients and marriage, divorce, inheritance problem.

Unit 8. Treatment Modalities - Methods of treatment: Overview of physiological methods – psychotropic medication, Electro convulsive therapy, surgical procedures etc. and psychological methods – the psychotherapies, behaviour therapy, therapeutic community, group methods etc.

Unit 9. Psychiatric Organizational Concerns – Hospital administration, rounds, purpose, and methods, mental health team approach. Out-patient services, in-patient services and ward management.

1. Dissertation will be based on the subject matter of syllabus of M. Phil. Part-I and Part – II.
2. Dissertation is to be submitted at least 1 month before the commencement of theory papers.
3. The dissertation is to be completed under the recognised guide as per the university norms.

In order to pass the M.Phil. P.S.W. Part I Examination a candidate must obtain 50% of the Maximum marks in written and viva-voce examination in each subject and 50% in Clinical Examination.
